A Vision for Orinda at this Year's Holiday Dinner



The Orinda Historical Society's annual holiday dinner will be held on Wednesday, December 2nd from 6 to 9pm at the Orinda Community Church.. The program will be the *Down-town Orinda - Yesterday and Tomorrow* featuring local architect **Bill Simpson** and the new Orinda Theater owner **Tom Peterson**.

Bill Simpson has always wanted a clear vision for Orinda's downtown (including both the village and crossroads). Simpson's firm, which does local residential and commercial projects, has been in Orinda since 1977. Simpson has lived in Orinda for 46 years and wonders, "What could Orinda be for our children?" He has been involved with many projects over the years, including rebuilding Orinda's Frank Lloyd Wright house after a devastating fire. When cartoonist Charles Schulz bought the office building at one Camino Sobrante, Simpson's firm remodeled it with an emphasis on making the streetscape more pleasant. Bill Simpson worked hard to have Orinda become a city and was elected as the new city's first planning commission chairman. Before that he served on the Contra Costa planning commission.

Simpson, Tom Peterson, and other guests will discuss the design and architecture of downtown Orinda from a historical perspective and beyond. Don't miss this informative and fun-filled evening. **RSVPs for the holiday dinner are due back to OHS by Friday, November 27th.**

Kay Norman Receives Prestigious Award

OHS board member Kay Norman was honored this past June by the Contra Costa Historical Societies. She received a 2009 individual award for outstanding volunteer service and accomplishments. Road Names in Orinda

In 1947, a pamphlet "Orinda Roads of Spanish or Historical Origin" by Carrie L. Smith Brown and decorated by Marjorie Smith Korn was written about the origin of road names in Orinda. A lot of the early road names are Spanish and begin with "Camino" which means road. While some are named for their function like Moraga Way (the way to Moraga), others are named for a natural feature such as El Toyonal after the toyon plant which is native to California and prevalent in this area. Here is an excerpt from this pamphlet - is your road listed? What does its name mean?

<u>Road Name</u>	<u>Meaning</u>
Acacia	Greek, meaning thorny
Acalanes	Spanish grant, named after Indians who once lived here
Alta Vista	View from the heights
Ardilla	The squirrel
Avenida de Orinda	Avenue of Orinda
Bien Venida	Welcome
Bonita	Beautiful
Cañon	Ravine
Camino de Encinas	Road of live oaks
Camino del Diablo	Devil's highway
Camino Don Miguel	Road named for Mr. Miguel de Laveaga who bought a large part of the Rancho Sobrante in 1886.
Camino El Ribero	Road of the dam
Camino Lenada	Shady road
Camino Sobrante	The Sobrante Rancho granted to Juan and Victor Castro included the leftover (sobrante) land lying between the ranchos San Antonio, Pinole, San Pablo, Valencia and Moraga
Contra Costa	Land of the shore opposite (opposite SF Presidio)
Cresta Blanca	White peak
Del Valle	The valley
Dias Dorados	Golden days
Dos Osos	The two bears
Dos Posos	The two wells
El Caminito	The little road
El Campanero	The bell ringer or clapper
El Dorado	Gold
El Gavilan	The hawk
El Patio	The courtyard
El Pulgar	The thumb
El Rincon	A little dell in an angle or a corner
El Sereno	Place of serenity
El Toyonal	Toyon or Christmas berry
El Verano	Summer
Encinas de Moraga	Live oaks of Moraga
Haciendas	Agricultural estates
La Bolsita	The little pocket
La Campana	The bell
La Cintilla	The ribbon

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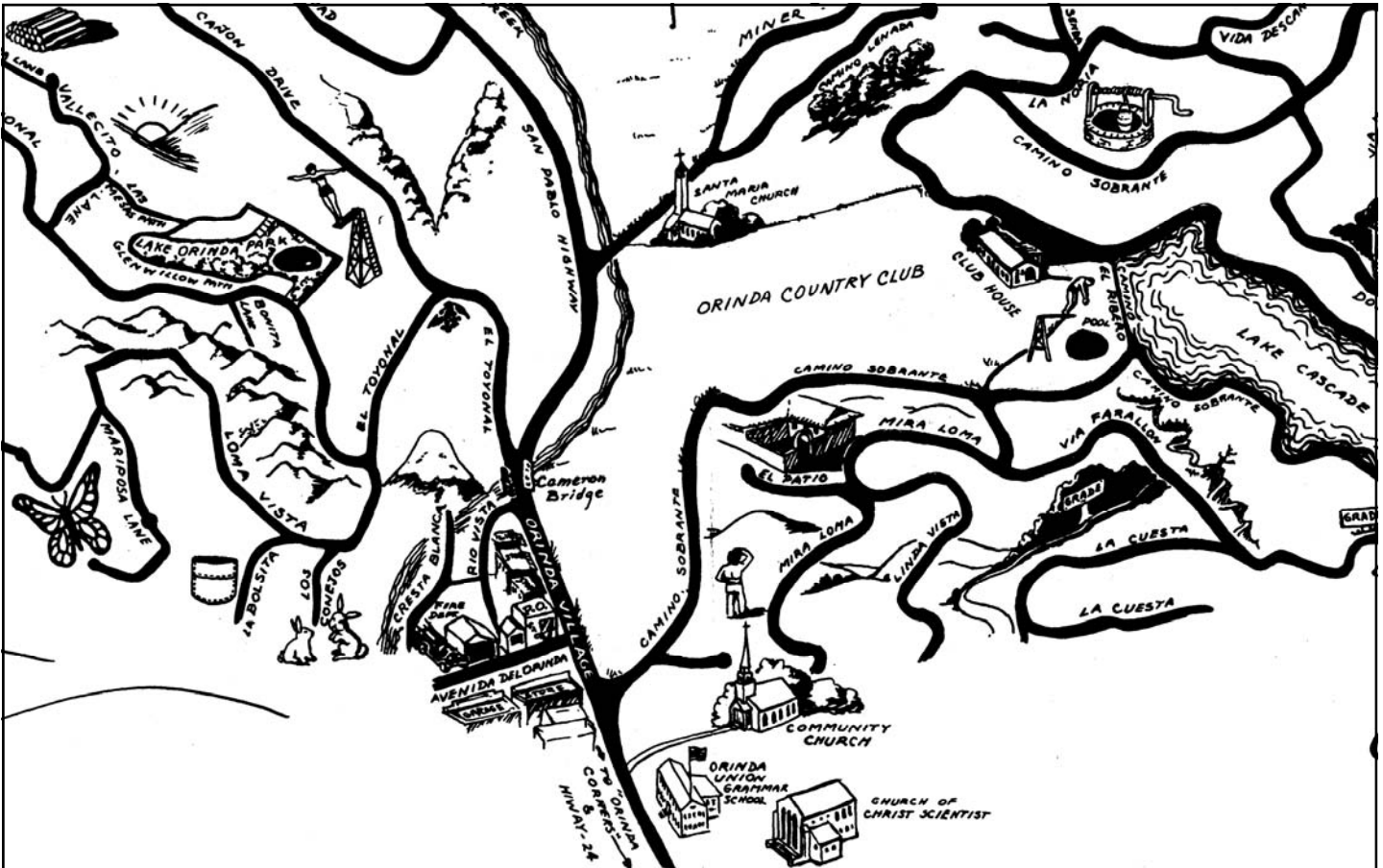

** The complete illustrations which show “Orinda roads” and “More Orinda roads” can be viewed at the Orinda Historical Society museum. Notice the changes in Orinda since 1947 such as: the Santa Maria Church is no longer on Miner road, Orinda Union Grammar School is now the community center and Lake Orinda Park is now called Orinda Park Pool.
